USE YOUR THUMB .

When using multiple bits in your Foredom, you often have to deal with several different shaft sizes - the usual 3/32 inch burs, the larger 1/8 inch shafts sizes and of course many different drill sizes. For some reason I really dislike having to turn the key multiple times to open or close the jaws of the handpiece chuck . There's nothing you can do to avoid multiple key turns when opening up the jaws, but there's a neat trick to close the jaws around a smaller shaft. Hold the new bit in the center of the open chuck jaws, put your thumb lightly onto the outer toothed collar of the chuck, and gently start up the Foredom. As the chuck

turns, it will naturally tighten the jaws around the shaft of the bit. Then all you have to do is a final tightening with the key.

Lindbergite The discoverer of the element radium

Sklodowskite A distinguished mineral collector. Her husband was Eugene.

Caresite Wife of Professor Peter Wyllie

Sophiite A French chemist

Carnotite A Russian volcanologist and mineralogist

Marialite A United States Geological Survey Scientist

Mcnearite A mineral collector and dealer from Sudbury, Mass.

Rondorfite Her full name was Maria Rosa von Rath

Olgite A mineralogist and crystallographer from Switzerland

Two minerals were named after Marie Curie-Sklodowska (1867-

1934), sklodowskite and curite (named after Marie and her husband, Pierre).

The mineral cuprosklodowskite was originally thought to be a copper-bearing version of sklodowskite and so its name bears Marie's name. Pierre and Marie Curie discovered the element radium.

The deep green mineral called szenicsite was discovered in Chile by Terry and Marissa Szenics. This mineral named was officially approved in 1994. The Szenics are American mineral collectors and mineral dealers. Szenicsite contains the elements copper and molybdenum. Marissa Szenics was born in 1950.

Columnar Jointing Article & Photos by Brenda Gadberry

In Northern Ireland there are about 40,000 huge obelisks, referred to as the "Giant's Causeway" or the geological term "columnar jointing". Each column has roughly six sides, but five to seven sided columns are common. The tallest column stands between 35 to 40 feet above the shoreline at the Irish Sea.

Columnar jointing is found across the world, but none as magnificent as the ones located in Northern Ireland which formed 50 to 60 million years ago from volcanic activity. While visiting Colorado, we found a hillside covered with columnar jointing. Although these columns were not as colossal as the ones in Ireland, they were still an interesting piece of geology to behold.

Basically, columnar jointing occurs during the cooling and contraction process of hot lava. The right conditions under the lava and the environment around the cooling surface must exist. When lava cools rapidly from the outside toward the center, it contracts, which produces cracks that continue to grow usually in a hexagonal pattern. The cracks spread normal to isotherms, not gravitational direction, creating various forms of columnar joints.

July Program Topic Oil Seeps in California by Steve Mulqueen

Speaker: Stephen P. Mulqueen, Department of Conservation, Division of Oil and Gas & Geothermal resources.

Stephen Mulqueen is presently employed as an Oil and Gas Engineer with the State of California, Department of Conservation, Division of Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Resources in Ventura. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Geology from Cal Poly, Pomona in 1978. Steve first studied and photographed petroleum seeps as an undergraduate student. His lecture is the result of over 20 years of observing petroleum seeps in and around the oil fields of California.

Title: Petroleum Seeps, A natural phenomenon with historic significance

Abstract: Petroleum seeps have known to exist in both onshore and offshore environments for million of years. They may consist of a variety of substances including crude oil, asphaltum, semisolid bitumen, and natural gas, often occurring with water that may range in quality from fresh water to supersaturated brine. Petroleum follows a complex path of migration from the source rock, being pushed through porous formations toward the surface by a variety of forces.

Petroleum seeps have been analyzed in great detail by geologists since the mid-1800s. Many oil fields throughout the world have been discovered as direct result of the natural occurrence of oil at the surface. Paleontologists have recognized oil seeps as important source of fossils. The Page Museum of La Brea Discoveries in Los Angeles contains millions of fossils excavated from asphaltum deposits in the shallow alluvium of the Los Angeles Basin. Archaeologists have found artifacts which were made in part from asphaltum. This and other factors suggests that the petroleum industry had an early beginning several thousand years ago. Biologists are now looking at petroleum seeps as a unique habitat for plants and animals.
