INEXPENSIVE ELECTRIC WAX PEN You can make your own wax pen from a small soldering iron plugged into a light dimmer switch for heat control. Both components are easily found at Radio Shack, a big hardware store or at Harbor Freight. For an example of the dimmer and soldering iron, see www.harborfreight.com items # 43060 and # 47887

Look for a soldering iron of around 25-30 watts. File the tip to the shape you prefer or even better get a soldering iron with replaceable tips. Then you can make several tip shapes for different tasks. Set the dimmer control just hot enough to melt the wax without producing any smoke.

Birthstone is a gift of a precious that symbolizes the month of birth in the Gregorian calendar. It is sometimes also called birthday stone

Traditional Birthstones Often combined with modern birthstone lists, traditional birthstones are older societybased birthstones. Since many different cultures had their own list, jewelers' lists are often inconsistent over what constitutes a traditional birthstone. The table below contains many stones which are popular choices, often reflecting Polish tradition. The Gregorian calendar has poems matching each month with its birthstone. These are traditionally the stones in English-speaking societies. It is not known whether these verses below originally are of the Gregorian calendar or not. In fact Tiffany & Co. published these poems "of unknown author" for the first time in a pamphlet in 1870

By her who in this month (January) is born No gem save garnets should be worn; They will ensure her constancy, True friendship, and fidelity.

The February-born shall find Sincerity and peace of mind, Freedom from passion and from care, If they an amethyst will wear.

Who in this world of ours their eyes In March first open shall be wise, In days of peril firm and brave, And wear a bloodstone to their grave.

She who from April dates her years, Diamonds shall wear, lest bitter tears For vain repentance flow; this stone, Emblem of innocence, is known.

Who first beholds the light of day In spring's sweet flowery month of May And wears an emerald all her life Shall be a loved and happy wife.

Who comes with summer to this earth. And owes to June her hour of birth, With ring of agate on her hand Can health, wealth, and long life command.

The glowing ruby shall adorn, Those who in July are born: Then they'll be exempt and free From love's doubts and anxiety.

Wear a sardonyx or for thee, No conjugal felicity; The August-born without this stone. Tis said, must live unloved and lone.

A maiden born when September leaves Are rustling in September's breeze, A sapphire on her brow should bind Twill cure diseases of the mind.

October's child is born for woe. And life's vicissitudes must know. But lay an opal on her breast, And hope will lull those woes to rest.

Who first comes to this world below In drear November's fog and snow, Should prize the topaz's amber hue, Emblem of friends and lovers true.

If cold December gave you birth, The month of snow and ice and mirth, Place on your hand a turquoise blue; Success will bless whate'er you do.

Modern birthstones

In 1912, in an effort to standardize birthstones, the organization Jewelers of America officially adopted a list, shown in the "Modern" column in the table below. It is currently the most widely used list in the United States and many other locations, including Australia and Thailand.

Mystical birthstones

Mystical Birthstones are of Tibetan origin and date back over a thousand years.

Avurvedic birthstones

The Ayurvedic birthstone list is from the ancient Indian medicine and philosophy dating back to ancient India (1500 BC)

Colors of Topaz

Test For Topaz

Topaz and quartz are not easy to separate by eye, and are sometimes impossible when the quartz is true topaz color. There is a big difference in price in the two and anyone describing quartz and topaz, however innocently, may well be in

trouble. Topaz is quite a different mineral, which is harder than quartz. Because of this, a drop of water will not spread on topaz, but will on quartz. Clean the stone with a cloth to remove all traces of grease. It must be dry before the test. Then place a small drop of water on it with a thin lass or metal rod. On stones with hardness of less than 7 on the Mohs Scale, the water is dispersed. On harder stones it will remain as a globule. The harder the stone, the more rounded will be the globule of water. Jadeite is a sodium- and aluminum-rich pyroxene. The gem form of the mineral is a microcrystalline interlocking crystal matrix. Jade is the semitransparent to translucent varieties. Hardness is 61/2 -7, and specific gravity is 3.3-3.5. The finest quality of jadeite comes from Burma. Hardness is 5-6 and specific gravity is 2.9-3.1. It is found in Alaska, British Columbia.

Jade is an ornamental stone. The term *jade* is applied to two different metamorphic rocks that are made up

of different silicate minerals: Nephrite

Nephrite from Wyoming
consists of a microcrystalline interlocking fibrous matrix of many minerals. The higher the iron content the greener the color. Nephrite jade is an ornamental stone, used in carvings, beads, or cabochon cut gemstones. bia, Wyoming, China and Siberia. The value of jade increases with transparency, color, evenness of color and freedom from flaws. The name is from the Spanish 'piedra de ijada', "stone of the side" in allusion the belief that jade could cure kidney disorders if applied to the side of the body. Precious jadeite is more valuable than precious nephrite.
